



#### **First Avenue Student Council News**

The First Avenue Student Council is comprised of student leaders well suited for their positions. They have all had to navigate through some minor ordeals before achieving the honor of being part of Student Council. The member met the three steps necessary for election: First, they completed an application that showed current citizenship per class grades, and the required teacher and parent signatures. Second, our leaders must prepare a speech and attend a review of their speech in front of two of the teaching staff. Last, but not least, is the grand event of stepping up to a microphone during a grade level assembly and delivering the speech. There are many candidates for the position of class representative, however, only 10 per grade level are selected. The eighth grader receiving the most votes from their classmates is determined to be the President and the eighth grader with the second highest vote count is determined to be the Vice-President of the Student Council. The term of office is for half of the school year, with elections being held in late September or early October, and then again in February.

After elections are over, Student Council representatives meet every other Wednesday at 7:30 AM in Room 37. During the first meeting of each half, the Student Council elects the Secretary and Treasurer for that term. The official business of the Student Council is to control the funds that are earned by the student body throughout the year. Primarily, they approve funding for activities and make decision on final payments for those activities. The Student Council also plans entertaining theme days, such as Spartan Spirit Day, Halloween Costume Day, Favorite Disney Character Day and many more to come.

#### **SSC Has Lunch on Campus**

Recently, we – the parent members of School Site Council – were treated to lunch at First Avenue Middle School! In addition to enjoying a tasty meal, we were given a tour of the food service facilities. We were so impressed with what we saw we just have to share it with you.

Our Principal, Mr. Wilson, showed us all of the different food options available to students such as the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program lunches, the Asian Food Bowl, pizza and ala carte items. As you can see from the photo, there were a lot of students out there eating lunch! Some students opt to bring lunches from home, but the majority of students purchase lunch on campus. We were amazed by what we saw: even with all of those people purchasing food, students went through the various lunch lines in under 9 minutes!



When you arrive at the lunch patio, you will see a new lunch service area to the right. This area houses the National School Breakfast and Lunch Program line, also known as the



Speed Line. If you are buying lunch in this area, you must exit with at least three items – an entrée, drink and side dish. If a student arrives at the cashier with only a sandwich or another entrée, they are asked to go back and get a side dish (something healthy like a side salad or an apple) and drink to round out the meal. Most kids buying lunch at this location enter their Student ID number on a pin-pad and the cost of the lunch is charged to their account. (Parents may deposit money into their child's account either online, or by sending

a check or cash to school with their student.) Some students pay with cash and this is acceptable, too. Additionally, if a student has forgotten to bring their lunch on any given day, they can go to this area and they will be provided with a lunch. The student will use the pin-pad

to enter their Student ID number, and the cost of the lunch will be charged to their account. There are two lines going through this lunch area and it is very well organized and easy to figure out.

Separate from the Speed Line is our updated Snack Shack. The Snack Shack contains three food lines. The first two offer food provided by outside vendors. One of the options is an Asian Food Bowl and beverage priced at \$4.00. The Asian Food Bowl varies from teriyaki chicken, orange chicken and broccoli beef. This item is so popular that it usually



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


sells out! Right next door is the pizza line. This, too, is very popular. It is an individual pizza, not just a slice, and it is provided by Round Table Pizza. The pizza is also accompanied by a choice of beverage. At either of these two lines, students may purchase their lunch with cash or by using the pin-pad to enter their Student ID number. Students may only

use the pin-pad option if they currently have money in their account.

Just around the corner from these two lines is the ala carte line. These would be items that supplement a student's lunch, whether brought from home or purchased at school. Ala carte items include Robek's smoothies (a favorite among students!), milk, water, fruit, chips, and cookies. Items at the ala carte line may only be purchased with cash.

We were all surprised that the food is quite good! Our number one choice for students who like salad is the Chi-



Do you know about the 'Lunch Bunch'? The 'Lunch Bunch' is a handful of 8<sup>th</sup> grade students who volunteer to spend the first 15 minutes of the lunch period helping to sell food items. In return, they receive a free lunch.



Mr. Wilson and Mr. Rod are joined at lunch by a counselor and three lunch proctors who help monitor students during the lunch period. Mr. Wilson said that he really enjoys being out with students and it was clear that he knows them well. Some kids bring their own basketballs to play during lunch, and Mr. Rod also has a few available for student use.

We were very happy to receive our tour and eat lunch on campus. We know how rare a treat it is to be a parent 'lunching' at First Avenue!so

## 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Update

As we close out the first trimester, you have probably seen a change in your sixth grade student. He or she is probably a bit more confident about being in a new school and has learned the routes to their classes without any issues.

Students have learned that their agenda is an important tool in their academic lives, and have become adept at using them to the fullest. Sixth grade teachers have consistently been using technology in the classroom to supplement lessons and make them more engaging. With ongoing construction at full speed, First Avenue has been a busy place this trimester.

Academically, sixth graders have been busy and working hard. Other than the benchmark tests which help us all to gage student learning, students are, or will be soon, reading the core literature book, Bud, Not Buddy, which has some great projects tied in to the literature such as the rulebook, riding the rails, and jazz music of the 1930's. Sixth graders are also learning how to write essays related to literature, which include character analyses, thematic essays, and narratives. History classes have been learning about ancient civilizations and how they came to be, including Mesopotamia and Egypt, through the use of projects like the Egyptian scrapbook, mummy project, and character recipe.

Mr. Townsend has been working on starting up the Science Club soon and will probably rename it the Garden Club or Ecology Club. They would like to begin building a new garden in the area of the old bike racks, and would like to have some of the projects tie in to other curricular areas. The newly renamed Garden/Ecology Club will probably meet after school one day a week, so look for announcements regarding enrollment in this club soon. The math classes have completed the beginning of year review and have embarked on pre algebra concepts. Not to be outdone, the physical education classes started the year with a ropics unit

and are currently engaged in hockey skills and games. They also focus on push-ups and agility drills daily.

## **First Avenue Traffic Report**

You may have noticed a different look on the California side of First Avenue Middle School. We have a new Music building and by the time you read this the old one will be gone. In addition to the physical changes, we have also

changed our student loading process in order to keep students safer as they arrive at school and leave at the end of the day. We have created a student loading zone just outside of the lunch pavilion. Cones are set up in order to direct cars and make it clear that there is only one lane for loading and one for passing. Parents are asked not to create a third lane to get around traffic faster. Doing so endangers drivers and passengers of oncoming traffic.



Drivers are also being asked to pull forward as far as possible in order to keep the traffic line moving quickly and smoothly. Cars that do not move forward cause traffic to back-up all the way to Santa Anita and sometimes even around the corner.

Students are only allowed to enter cars in the student loading zone, which begins just outside of the lunch pavilion area under the metal awning and extends eastward to the gate near the new music building. Students are only allowed to cross the street at the crosswalk, again for safety reasons. Signs are posted that students are not to be dropped off or picked up on the opposite side of the street.

Our number one goal is student safety. We understand that everyone is busy and often in a hurry, but your patience in the loading process helps us keep ALL students safe. Please allow enough time to deliver and pick-up your student while keeping all of our kids safe and sound.

## **Keeping Kids Busy Offline Keeps Them Safer Online**

The Online Mom reports that recent research from Queensland, Australia has drawn a parallel between the activities of children offline and the likelihood of them getting into trouble online. Griffith University researchers Margee Hume and Gillian Sullivan-Mort interviewed over 150 children between the ages of 10 and 18 and found that those involved in fewer extracurricular activities were also the ones most likely to exhibit risky behavior online.



During the course of the study, Hume found that keeping children occupied and active away from the computer was one of the key components of cultivating a healthy and safe relationship with the Internet. "Exercise was a big factor. All the kids who were participating in sports or dancing and other activities not involving the Internet had experienced fewer problems online," she said.

They had a better sense of self and wellbeing and could balance out instances of cyber-bullying with their friendships away from the school and the web. The children who were most at risk were those who were socially and geographically isolated and did not have a strong interest in other activities. "In many respects, it's not what children are doing online which is the problem, it's the balance of what they are doing offline which is important," said Hume.

The researchers found there were plenty of strategies parents could put in place to protect their children which they were not currently implementing. As a result, they have called for the development of guidelines to help parents prevent their children from being exposed to dangers on the Internet. "Lack of parental supervision, isolated or excessive computer use, and lack of offline activity all increase the risks associated with online activity," Hume said.

Hume and Sullivan-Mort said the potential dangers faced by children included cyberbullying, adults and children impersonating other users, the exchange of intimate photos and videos, and the sharing of personal secrets online. "We need to have easily accessible and affordable programs for parents, as well as a strong social marketing campaign which draws attention to the dangers children face online and how to protect them," Hume said.

However, "we can't keep blaming the tool," she added. "The importance of parental involvement and a strong roster of offline activities can't be emphasized enough."

## **Protect Your Family**

Dear Parents,

We realize that you may still have concerns about the H1N1 (Swine Flu). A letter was sent out to you back in April of this year regarding this illness, but some of the information is worth repeating .

This flu can cause a wide range of symptoms, including fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people have vomiting and diarrhea. If your child should have these symptoms, please contact your health care provider about any special care that they may need, and if any medications are recommended. Try to keep ill person away from others as much as possible to avoid spreading this illness.

Also, please have ill student stay home for at least 24 hours after fever and other symptoms are gone, so when the student returns to school they are symptom free without the use of any medications. This is most important to help control the spread of this illness!

There are a few precautions you can do and to instruct your child to do as well to help prevent and /or stop the spread of this flu. These precautions are always good to use during any time illness is present.

- Wash your hands often in running water with lots of soap for 20 seconds
- Cover coughs and sneezes with tissues or by coughing into the inside of the elbow. Throw the tissue into the trash, and immediately wash your hands afterward.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches their eyes, nose or mouth.
- Stay at least 3 feet away from people who are sick if possible.

We have also put in the hallways at First Avenue automatic dispensing machines that dispense hand sanitizing lotion for our students to use as needed .
