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# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

#### First Avenue Rocks!!

On April 20, 2011 a small group of PTSA volunteers and school staff sat down together to talk about the possibility of hosting a Community Festival to go along with our annual Community Concert. The brainstorming session led to suggestions about involving teachers in game booths, parents and volunteers with food booths, and our amazing students taking care of the entertainment. One of our teachers suggested adding a silent auction to the event. Ron Gutierrez volunteered to take on the food service and promised tri-tip sandwiches. Under Vicky

Stiles' leadership and a relentless team of PTSA volunteers including Vicky, Doris Hayata, Terri Powell, Randa Weir, Maryann Stevens and Theresia Liem, supplemented later by Ron Gutierrez and Judy Lee (prizes), we had an amazing Community Concert & Festival on Sunday, May 22<sup>nd</sup>. Nearly 2,000 people attended and nearly \$14,000 was made to support our schools through AEF. The event

brought the community closer together and calls were immediately heard to make the Festival an annual tradition.

JUNE 2011

On May 6, we had an assembly to celebrate the conclusion of state testing. Ishaan Dev, our Student Body President challenged the students to participate in a Jogathon the following Friday and to raise money to help maintain the excellence of our schools here in Arcadia and to help save teacher jobs. For one week, students elicited support through onetime donations and

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per lap commitments. When the dust settled on Friday the 13<sup>th</sup>, we had over \$30,000 in cash and checks. Following a final accounting this week, the Jogathon raised over \$58,800 – simply amazing.

Not content to rest on our laurels, a Penny War was initiated by Mr. Gould and, once again, the students jumped right in. After an 8-day war, the stu-

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dents had raised an additional \$5,700 towards the AEF campaign.

In a little over a month's time, the First Avenue community managed to raise nearly \$79,000 to support the Arcadia Educational Foundation knowing that all of that money would be used to support our teachers, and, as a result, allow us to maintain our elective programs, music, and all of the amazing extracurricular programs.

This is foreign territory for all of us who went into the teaching profession with an ideal to activate young minds by exposing them to curriculum, programs and activities that would produce knowledgeable lifelong learners ready to take on the world. Due to a broken system of state and federal educational funding and unfulfilled promises by various leaders from both political parties, we find ourselves in the uncomfortable position of having to fight for what we believe is the right of every Arcadia student – to be exposed to and have an opportunity to experience a world-class education where the needs of the whole child are met through a rigorous academic program coupled with a wide and varied elective and extracurricular program.

While it feels like all we have talked about is money for the past 6 months, I can assure you that the work of providing our students the best possible education continues to thrive here at First Avenue with hard-working and creative teachers using their gifts to challenge and prepare our students for Arcadia High School and beyond. Our robust elective program has produced some of the best musicians, actors, artists, videographers, wood-workers, and chefs that our school has ever produced. Our future writers, mathematicians, scientists, historians and athletes continue to produce excellence. I feel like the cohesivness between our students, staff, parents and community has never been stronger. It is amazing what trials will do for you. What is the old saying? "What doesn't kill you will only make you stronger." I can tell you that today, as we close down a great, great year that First Avenue Middle School has never been stronger.

The past few weeks have been a whirlwind! We had California State Testing, Teacher Appreciation Week, Production Plays, 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Workshop in the Woods, 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Greek Days, Night at the Movies and the 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Ellis Island simulation. On top of all that we started two new traditions.

On Friday, May 13<sup>th</sup> we saw the entire student body participate in the first ever district-wide middle school Jog-a-Thon. First Avenue students ran/jogged/walked during their P.E. period while raising funds for the Arcadia Educational Foundation. School Principal Mr. Wilson blared rock anthems and encouraged the students by running laps himself, joining several teachers who came out to support the students during their prep periods. We had a few



students who ran about six miles in 40 minutes, incredible! While students were running, some parent volunteers were passing out water to the runners and others were tallying lump sum donations. After collecting pledges in total, First Avenue students raised \$58,800!

The following week we had another first, the Community Concert & Festival. We have had community concerts in the past but this was different. We had teacher and staff sponsored game and activity booths; a silent auction; ticket auction; used book, DVD, and CD sale; bake sale, plant sale; and the very popular pie throwing booth and dunk tank. What's a festival without food? The aroma of grilled tri-tip sandwiches, hamburgers and hot dogs filled the air. Cupcakes, candy cotton, popcorn and sno-cones made for great snacks and dessert! The small team, drill team, production, and musical performances provided wonderful entertainment (although seeing Mr. Wilson in his colorful bathrobe was pretty fun too).

The planning committee was comprised of Principal Mr. Wilson, Assistant Principal Mrs. Issa, Office Manager Mrs. Weir; and parents Ron Gutierrez, Doris Hayata, Judy Lee, Theresia Liem, Terri Powell, Maryann Stevens, and myself. We had a crew of volunteers on festival day itself, and it's no cliché to say that we

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couldn't have done it without them! In addition to teachers and staff, parents, Boy and Girl Scouts and high school students also volunteered their time to work in the booths, sell tickets, serve food and award prizes.

Local businesses and generous individuals (see page 7 & 8 for a list) donated all the game prizes, auction items and Wheel of Fortune prizes. So on top of showcasing the wonderful programs at our school, bringing in the community and having fun, we raised nearly \$14,000. It was a tremendously successful event on all counts.

Then most recently Mr. Gould organized Penny Wars among the grades. Penny by penny (and quite a few bills and checks in the other grades' jars), the 6th Grade class won bragging rights. Our students raised an additional \$5,700. All profits from the Jog-a-Thon, Community Concert & Festival and Penny Wars will be do-



nated to the Arcadia Educational Foundation (AEF) to fund teacher and staff positions to help maintain the quality programs Arcadia Unified offers to its students. In total nearly \$79,000 was raised over the two weeks, more than enough for another teaching position in the district. The continuing generosity of the First Avenue family amazes and inspires me. Through the combined district-wide fundraising efforts, AEF is gifting the District enough funds for 12 positions!

However, we cannot let up. While this school year is winding down, we are still uncertain what the budget situation will be for the State of California and so for our schools. We need to be vigilant with our elected officials and to advocate on behalf of our children. We need to continue to talk to our friends and neighbors so they are aware of the problems our schools are facing and how it impacts them, regardless of whether or not they have children in the district. We need to continue to support AEF. We know the value of our schools. We have shown that our community will band together to protect the school programs that are important to us. Appropriately our PTSA theme this year was "Together We Can", and we have shown just how true it is! Congratulations First Avenue!

#### FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S DESK...

Hello First Avenue Community,

Although I usually play the role of taking care of business, from discipline to schedules, and yes, the traffic line at drop off and pick up, I decided to reflect on my observations and heartfelt appreciation of our great school. Without a doubt, the overriding sentiment in my heart is that our students and families are incredible human beings in how they care so much about their teachers and each other. They represent the best of their families, many of whom are active PTSA members.

The morning begins on Diamond Street at 8am, as I chat with my colleagues and bid greetings to all the students getting dropped off. The students, ready for their day at First Avenue, walk briskly with enthusiasm to their first class. Then there are the late ones, who run towards the gate hoping to sprint by with a quick "Hi Mrs. Issa!" before it closes. Mr. Gund, a teacher who volunteers his time every day for morning supervision, loudly urges the students to rush before the tardy bell rings, but scolds the parents, good-naturedly of course, for driving too fast to get them to the gate. At the tardy bell, those students who are running through the gate rush in apologetically, and I say those dreaded words, "Go to the office and get a tardy slip!" The music goes on the school wide loudspeaker, alerting us that the Pledge of Allegiance is about to begin. Within a minute, the sounds around us are of students reporting the morning news, Student Council talking about the latest contest, and Mr. Wilson announcing which games will be played at lunch.

On this particular morning, the school is abuzz with the way all the 8<sup>th</sup> graders are dressed, in early 20<sup>th</sup> century immigrant clothing, ready to participate in the Ellis Island simulation. (See article and photos on page 18-19.) The 8<sup>th</sup> grade teachers have spent the morning setting up the final details for processing center, the museum, and other activities that the students will participate in. The week before, the 6<sup>th</sup> graders, fully dressed in Greek attire, participated in Greek Days (see page 24), showcasing their talents and representing their city-state. A few weeks before, the 7<sup>th</sup> graders participated in Workshop in the Woods (see pages 22-23), taking part in activities related to medieval time period. These simulations and events provide our students with a glimpse into the past, creating a memory that will help them to internalize what they have learned.

All around me, students are busy with studying in different ways, not just paper and pencil activities. The spirit of competition is healthy as I watch Mrs. Mora's 6<sup>th</sup> grade class walking noisily to a 7<sup>th</sup> grade class to "bomb them" for the penny wars. Squeals of laughter are heard down the hallway as they approach Mr. Gould's room. They might not know it, but these students are engaged in learning about civics by raising funds to save the teachers who are losing their jobs. This is just a sample of the type of experiences our students participate in to build their practical knowledge, and it is these experiences that students remember the most later in their lives. Our teachers believe this philosophy of educating the whole child provides engaging experiences that shape their minds and gives them a new perspective and appreciation of life itself.

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#### AP's Message

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One thing visitors to our school notice is that students are smiling and happy to be here. What they don't know is that our students are not only enthusiastic about learning, but they are accomplished in music, art, drama, industrial tech, video production, computers, sports, and of course, academics. However, they are also unaware of the fact that the PTSA is tremendously involved in the school, supporting the teachers and staff with every activity and event, whether it be taking pictures of the multitude of activities, setting up concerts, providing refreshments, taking on fundraising activities, counting money or planning the 8<sup>th</sup> grade promotion party. The students are amazing because of their families, who feel a close association to our school, and because of the teachers, who invest their hearts and minds into their students. Every day that goes by, I learn something new that makes me feel more connected to the school community and this connectedness is a gift that helps me to carry out my job better.

I feel extremely honored and blessed to be the Assistant Principal of the absolute best middle school in the State. First Avenue Middle School is the quintessence of what works in education. A school where the staff considers themselves an extended family; where the teachers educate your children with the philosophy of the whole child in mind while maintaining academic rigor; where the PTSA is extremely supportive of the school's endeavors in educating your children; all in addition to the fact that your children are such incredible human beings. When it comes right down to the heart of the matter, you all humble me, and I hope that I can be as good an administrator as you all deserve. Thank you *ALL* for a great first year. 


















### FA Helps Children in Japan by Making Origami Cranes

On April 25, 2011, Emily Tom with all the help and support of students, teachers and administrators at First Avenue Middle School was able to deliver 4,918 origami cranes to OshKosh children's clothing store. OskKosh, in turn, will ship the cranes to the children in quake-stricken Japan. Emily's initial goal of 100 to 200 cranes mushroomed to the point where everyone at First Avenue was making cranes of all sizes for Japan.



For each crane donated, OshKosh was to do-

nate an article of clothing (up to 50,000) to a child in Japan. Emily received an email from an OshKosh representative thanking everyone for a great job. With over one million cranes received, OshKosh stated it is now sending 80,000 garments to the children of Japan.

The cranes will be shipped to Japan and put on display in Tokyo in early June. Follow up on Facebook in June to follow the cranes' trip to Japan. In Japanese culture, cranes are a powerful symbol of health and wellwishes. In fact, the Japanese people believe that anyone who makes 1,000 origami cranes will have a wish granted. ## Ellis Island—8th Grade!

On Thursday, May 26, First Avenue's 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Class journeyed over 50 years back in time for our annual Ellis Island Day. Ellis Island served as the principal immigration station from 1892 to 1954, processing over 12 million men, women, and children. About 4 out of 10 Americans have ancestors who entered the country through Ellis Island.

In the morning, students arrived at school dressed as European immigrants. They simulated the process of going through the Ellis Island Immigration Station. The immigrants were greeted by 6

enced at Ellis Island. Though translators were available at the real Ellis Island as well as First Avenue's, students faced much frustration as they travelled through processing.

After successfully passing through these stations, all of the students were cleared, their passports were stamped and they were sent to enjoy their life in America and the rest of the activities for Ellis Island Day.

One of the highlights of the day was the First Avenue Middle School's Immigration Museum. The Museum contained almost 300 mini-posters created by fellow 8<sup>th</sup>



grade students using information collected from oral history interviews which students held with former immigrants prior to Ellis Island Day. Countries represented in the museum included: Egypt, China, Vietnam, El Salvador, Mexico, Korea, Malaysia, India, Philippines, Taiwan, Burma, Hong Kong, Japan, Lebanon, Panama and Great Britain to name a few. Each student enjoyed analyzing several of these posters.



Ellis Island was one of many fun and educational events that this year's 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Class experienced. Earlier this year, they took





Apache Days for the 2011-2012 SCHOOL YEAR will be August 16-22nd! Seniors will register on Tuesday 8/16, Juniors on Wednesday 8/17, Sophomores on Thursday 8/18, and **Freshmen on Friday 8/19th.** Make-up Day for all grade levels is Monday August 22nd. AHS families will be receiving passwords from Arcadia Unified School District the first week of August. Using these passwords, families are required to fill out two District forms: the Annual Notification to Parents and the Emergency Contact Form. Each form has a signature page which must be printed out and signed by the parent. Bring these two forms to Apache Days along with the rest of the Apache Day Packet. (Same as you did at FA.)

When you complete the district forms, you MUST continue online to the high school site. These forms must be completed, printed out, and signed BEFORE you come to Apache Days. If you do not bring these forms, you will not be allowed to start the registration process. If you do not have access to a computer and cannot get to the Arcadia Public Library prior to your scheduled registration time to access a computer, please arrange to come to Arcadia High School with a parent to complete your paperwork in the computer lab. Filling out the online forms will take a full hour, so please allow for time to complete these forms before your scheduled registration time. Please make sure your parent brings all the emergency contact information, insurance form numbers, and identification materials necessary to fill out all the forms. On July 1<sup>st</sup>, there must be proof of immunization of the tDap in your student's file prior to the 2011-2012 school year. If your student does not bring their proof, they will NOT be going through the registration process. This translates to they will NOT be attending school until they have an immunization and the immunization record recorded at school. Please bring proof of vaccination to the school health office as soon as possible to avoid this delay of registration.

Apache Days...every year, during the five days of registration, thousands of students (over 95%) are able to pay their fees, get their schedules and books, and begin the process of orienting to our campus. There will be more than 300 parent volunteers for the entire process. Please be timely, fill out the forms, bring your 8th grade school ID (save it over the summer) and bring a backpack for your books. Thanks to our efficient volunteers and staff, no student should take longer than 2 hours to register during Apache Days!

In advance, we'd also like to say a big THANK YOU to all the parents who say yes when they are contacted to help! It takes over 300 volunteers to make this event a success. Apache Day volunteers are such a valuable resource, we appreciate your participation! Please contact us ASAP if you are available to volunteer for a 3 hour shift. Let us know what day and time (morning or afternoon), you can work. A perk for your student, if you volunteer to help, is that they will get a First in Line and a "Fast Pass" for the 2 impacted contact points. We will also need volunteers on the first morning of the school year, August 29<sup>th</sup>, at 6:45a.m.until 10ish. # Workshop in the Woods—7th Grade Experience

What a great way to celebrate the end of state testing with a field trip! First Avenue's annual Workshop in the Woods field trip took place on Friday, May 4, 2011. Seventh grade stu-

#### NEW CALIFORNIA IMMUNIZATION LAW

All students entering 7th through 12th grade in the fall, must show proof of receiving a Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis) booster on or after their 10th birthday. The law specifies that no student will be allowed to begin school without it, so avoid delays in registration, get your vaccine now and bring proof to the health office. Personal belief exemptions may be accepted, but must be signed by the parent or guardian in-person in the school office.
